B. COURSE TEXTBOOK

C. COURSE GENERAL OBJECTIVES

- Examine social and cultural issues affecting girls and boys as well as young adults.
- Deconstruct myths and realities about social morbidities such as depression, bullying, suicide, disordered eating, substance use, sexual activity, and troubled family relationships.
- Probe the provocative question why adolescent girls in America succumb to devastating social morbidities at such alarming rates.
- Examine the premise that youth grow up in a toxic, media-driven culture where they lose their identities and a sense of their true selves.
- Reflect on ways the critical life decisions you made during adolescence affect your life now as a young adult.

D. COURSE ACTIVITIES

1. Class Discussion of Case Studies and Selected Passages of Text

Do the following to prepare before each class: (1) Case Studies. Select 1 case study from each chapter that includes case studies, and be prepared to discuss the actions, consequences, and "lessons learned" from the case study. (2) Selected Passages of Text. From each chapter, select 2 poignant passages of text, and be prepared to share the passages.

2. Personal Critique of Reviving Ophelia, by Dr. Mary Pipher

Prepare a critique of **about 1,000 words** that details your assessment of the nature, extent, and implications of the issues identified in the book. Write the critique based on your own life experiences and personal impressions of the book. Give your candid assessment of the book, both positive and negative. You decide how to structure your paper in terms of content, organization, style, and tone.

Note: For your critique, please submit: (1) a cover sheet with the book title, your name, the course (IDH 3931), and semester/year; and (2) a typed, double-spaced, critique of about 1,000 words. Staple the materials in the upper-left corner, with the cover sheet on top. (Do not use folders, binders, report covers, or notebooks.)

Reviving Ophelia Book Critique Due: November 15, 2016 (T)

3. Class Presentation of Group Action Plans

Prepare a **15 minute presentation** of a group Action Plan that proposes broad-based solutions to issues identified in the book. Address 3 components in the presentation:

Introduction. Summarize the nature, extent, and implications of problems identified in the book.

Solutions. Recommend 15 specific solutions, including 5 individual solutions, 5 family solutions, and 5 community solutions.

Evaluation. For each solution, describe (1) the action you recommend, (2) the individual or group responsible for taking the action, and (3) the criteria used to determine if the solution works.

Note: Please provide each class member with a print handout that summarizes your presentation. Provide the instructor with 1 copy of the handout, and 1 print copy of slides or additional materials used in your presentation.
