Grading

Participation and Talking Points.

Each week you are expected to write one paragraph each for TWO discussion points you would like to see addressed during class time. (total of two paragraphs for 5% credit) These <u>are due by noon the the day prior to class (ie on Wednesday).</u> They should be posted in E-learning. You will be graded for 10 of the total of 15 weeks. Hence, this means you can miss 5 without an impact to your grade and it is not expected that you post the week you are leading a class discussion.

These "talking points" will be utilized to organize class discussion and lecture items. Your "talking points" may also be posed as chemistry topics you wish to learn more details about. I ask for them to be posted a day before the discussion so it gives the discussion leader time to organize their presentation to include your items.

The emphasis of the class participation and discussion is to ensure you do the reading prior to class time and have thought about what you read and put it into context of historical, political and societal issues that are of interest to you.

Essays.

You will write two reflection essays (2-3 pages double spaced types) that delve deeper into specific discussion points you found of interest and impactful to your everyday life. Guidelines for essay length and grading will be provided on-line.

Discussion Leader.

For one class period you will be the discussion leader. You need to come prepared to lead various discussion talking points of your own as well as have read those points presented by your classmates. I will be the discussion leader for the first few weeks and you should use me as a model for what you need to do to prepare to be effective. Depending on how many students enroll for the class it maybe

that there are two discussion leaders each week. In this case you may work as a team to prepare for the class. Discussion leading can involve just lectures, preparation of overheads, utube or other internet information and content that relates to the discussion topics.
