This course will use Canvas (http://elearning.ufl.edu/) throughout the term for announcements, instructions, grades, and other resources. The instructions and grades will not be distributed in class, so it is your responsibility to check E-Learning to access those materials. All written work must be submitted electronically on E-Learning.

This course explores the creative process and history behind a Rodgers and Hammerstein musical. We'll go behind the scenes for a performance of "The King and I" at the Phillips Center.

Objectives:

- Explore the creation of the original Broadway production of "The King and I."
- Learn about Anna Leonowens and King Rama IV, whose lives inspired the musical.
- Review cultural perception in successive productions, including the one on tour this fall.

The course begins with the creative process behind a theatrical production. We will explore the work of Richard Rodgers and Oscar Hammerstein, especially their encounter with the story of "Anna and the King of Siam." We'll explore further to understand the world of Anna Leonowens and King Rama IV in 1860's Thailand. The course will end with a discussion of creative inspiration, and cultural perception. We will attend a performance of "The King and I.".

Course Requirements

Readings: Short readings are assigned for some classes. You are encouraged to do the readings <u>before</u> each class. You are also encouraged to read the performing arts news on a major news website (e.g., New York Times, Washington Post, available free online) and to peruse online resources regularly. Please feel free to email links and comments to the Instructor.

Attendance and In-Class Work: The course combines material from lecture, discussion, and assigned readings as well as the internet. Class attendance is expected -- much of the in-class presentation and discussion will be different from the textbook and readings.

Take-Home Assignments: There will be three (3) take-home assignments (~1-2 pages each). Instructions and due dates will be posted on E-Learning. These assignments are worth <u>50 points each (150 points total)</u>. You must turn in completed assignments electronically on E-Learning no later than class time (9:35 am) on the posted deadline and turn in a hard copy in class – late work will be accepted <u>only with approval of the instructor</u> if there are serious circumstances. Come prepared to class on the due date to discuss your assignment.
