Instructors:

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Objectives:

- Review the history of musicals in U.S. theatre.
- Explore the narrative structures of musicals and how they work.
- Understand tour production in the performing arts, and the economics of the arts.
- Assess the significance of the performing arts for culture and community.

Description:

The course begins with a discussion of the performing arts and their creation and production. We will explore musicals in the performance series presented by the University of Florida Performing Arts, including the productions' development and background. There will be a backstage tour of the Phillips Center, and possibly a production. Attendance for one performance is required.

Topics include:

- Producing performances and performing arts tours
- Musicals and narrative structure
- Presenting performance series

Required Text:

The Secret Life of the American Musical, 1st ed. (2016) Jack Viertel.

Course Requirements

Readings: Short readings are assigned for most classes. You are encouraged to do the readings before each class. You are also encouraged to read the performing arts news on a major news website (e.g., New York Times, Washington Post, available free online) and to peruse online resources regularly. Please feel free to email links and comments to the Instructor.

Attendance and In-Class Work (30%): The course combines material from lecture, discussion, and assigned readings as well as the internet. Class attendance is expected -- much of the in-class

presentation and discussion will be different from the textbook and readings.

Take-Home Assignments (30%): There will be two (2) take-home assignments (~1-2 pages each). Instructions and due dates will be posted on E-Learning. These assignments are worth 50 points each (100 points total). You must turn in completed assignments electronically on E-Learning no later than class time (9:35 am) on the posted deadline and turn in a hard copy in class – late work will be accepted only with the approval of the instructor if there are serious circumstances. Come prepared to class on the due date to discuss your assignment.

Final Presentation and Report (40%): There will be a final project where you will need to present and deconstruct using the pieces of Viertel one of your favorite musicals.

Exams: There are no exams.
