Welcome!

Please call me Melina. I prefer *she/her* pronouns. Thank you for signing up for this class! I have read this book a few times and love it, which is why I wanted to create a course and chat with others who might (or might not) love it too. Throughout the course, we'll be talking about big topics like fame, polarization, and first contact. We'll also be discussing small topics like word choice, character development and love. As we go through the course, I encourage you to push yourself and your peers to think deeply about the topics we encounter together. If you disagree with me or your peers, please share that with us! Our disagreements help us grow as critical thinkers.

If you are struggling with this course, with your other courses, or with life outside of the university, I invite you to talk to me or someone that you trust. If this is your first semester at UF, or your first semester back since the pandemic started (like it is for me), it can be overwhelming. Just talking about those feelings can help. If just talking with your instructors, your friends, or your family isn't enough, there is a list of campus resources on the last page of this syllabus to help you. I am happy to help you understand how these can be helpful for you.

COVID-19 and Our Classroom

We are still in a global pandemic. Each of us have been affected differently by the past 18 months. I ask that we not make assumptions about others' experiences with the virus and that we are more compassionate with each other and ourselves. I hope that together we will strive to make this semester safe, insightful, and fun.

Until we have a better sense of the virus and its variants, I plan to wear my mask in class. I invite you to do the same. If you are sick, particularly with any symptoms of COVID-19, please do not come to class. You never own me personal information about your mental or physical health. However, you are always welcome to talk to me about whatever you're going through. If you tell me that you're having trouble, I'm not going to judge you or think less of you. If you need extra help or if you need to miss a class or need more time with an assignment, please ask. I will work with you to make sure you have the opportunity to learn the material you may miss because of an illness or other life issues.

Required Textbook

Course Description & Goals

We will read *An Absolutely Remarkable Thing* during the semester and explore questions of internet fame, polarization, power, and first contact. We will participate in meaningful dialogue centered on the text and we will make connections to other texts provided in class, life experiences, and events in the world, both currently and historically. We will engage in weekly online posts and in-class discussions. You will work with a partner to respond to the text with a video (and I might make one, too).

Course Objectives

- *Content and Critical Thinking*: Students will read about, identify, explain, and analyze the ideas of fame, influence, and power in the context of the internet and their connections to first contact.
- *Communication*: Students will articulate their thoughts, reflect their personal feelings, and communicate with others about their responses to the required text.

Evaluation of Grades

Weekly online discussion posts and replies

You will be responding to questions based on the week's readings by Wednesday. The questions are open-ended but do require that you've read the 20-40 pages for that week. You can find the rubric for theses on each post.

After our class discussions on Thursdays, you will return to the week's post and reply to your peers by Sunday. As I noted earlier, in these posts, I want us to think deeply about the topic, so I will be pushing you to make connections and perhaps disagree because of your interpretations or experiences. A simple, "I agree! Your response is great" won't be enough. We will also be sharing phrases, sentences or quotes that stand out to us.

Attendance and Class Expectations

Attendance is required for class discussions. If you need to miss class, please email or message me on Canvas so that we may discuss options. During class, I ask that you do not use cellphones or laptops as they are not necessary for the in-class activities unless otherwise stated. I also ask that we are respectful during class discussions, especially since I'm asking you to share your experiences and disagreements. I believe thoughtful discussions will lead to better understandings of the text and each other.

Group Video Response

As you read the book (perhaps again), make note of the places where you have a strong reaction. If you lived in the world of April May and the Carls, what would make you record a video reaction? As you interact with your peers, find someone who has a strong reaction to that same point. You'll be responding to the characters, the situation, or even the author using video in a format that you're most comfortable with (TikTok, YouTube, Reels).

You will NOT be required to post your reaction on these sites; they will be posted on Canvas. However, if you and your partner both agree to post it outside of our class (and tag Hank Green), that is encouraged!

Make-Up Policy

If you miss or do not complete an in-class assignment or online module, I will send you a gentle reminder to make sure that you are doing ok. I prefer late engagement than no engagement at all. But timely engagement is the best! The final video response has a stricter deadline because it will be our last assignment. But as with everything else, if you are struggling with that assignment, please talk to me.
