COURSE DESCRIPTION AND LEARNING OUTCOMES

She is messy, but she's kind
She is lonely most of the time
She is all of this mixed up and baked in a beautiful pie

Do you want to explore pie-baking and life lessons? This course is for you! We will have some beginning baking lessons in the kitchen (and you can eat your homework!). Learn to make classic crusts and crumb crusts. Make a creme, nut, fruit, chocolate, and savory pies. We will cover how musicals, and Waitress, in particular, are constructed. Waitress also tackles the difficult topic of taking charge of your life - how do you do that when you feel trapped by circumstance?

LO 1: Constructs of a musical will be identified

LO 2: The progression of women and musical theater will be actualized

LO 3: Safety and culinary baking skills will be tested and applied

Reflection Journal Entries

These journal entries are designed to encourage reflection and self-discovery throughout the semester.
