## **Course Description:**

This course reviews the book, *The Incredible Unlikeliness of Being: Evolution and the Making of Us,* by Alice Roberts. Together, we will discuss the biological evidence presented by the author to describe human development and evolution. We will evaluate historical scientific perspectives, and their contributions to modern scientific work.

## **Student Learning Objectives:**


Upon successful completion of this course, students will:


- 1. Develop introductory background in discussions on evolutionary development.
- 2. Understand the contributions of historical scientific works.
- 3. Discuss and evaluate scientific arguments presented in scientific literature (books, journals, reviews, etc.)
- 4. Apply knowledge of embryology to describe the evolutionary history of us.

#### *Opening paper (5%)*

Students will write on their initial perspectives, background knowledge, and personal philosophies relating to human development and evolutionary theory. The assignment will also be used later in the semester as a journal prompt to help with your reflection.

## Attendance and Participation (15%)

Students are expected to attend class and contribute to the class discussion. **Attendance is required.** If you need to miss class for unforeseen circumstances, please notify the instructor as soon as possible.

#### Discussion Leader (10%)

Students will guide weekly discussion on the assigned readings. Discussion leaders are responsible for formulating discussion questions and sharing their insights and reflections. Your instructor will assist you during this process. Questions or discussion points should be shared with the instructor prior to class meetings.

#### Reading journal (50%)

Students will keep a virtual reading journal, which you are expected to submit weekly reflection. The journal will be kept private from your peers to further encourage you to share your reflections with your instructor and build upon in class discussions.

#### Final paper (20%)

Students will have the opportunity to propose a topic of interest related to the reading they would like to explore and further research independently. Your proposals will be due by 10/21 for instructor approval.

#### Policy on Late and Make-up Work

Graded requirements that are submitted late due to a documented illness or emergency may be rescheduled; however, 48 hours prior notice should be given to the instructor, and documentation must be supplied.
