Course Description

We will discuss *Circe* by Madeline Miller, a retelling of the prominent character in Homer's classic epic, "The Odyssey." Miller expands upon Circe's origin and her battle to claim an identity among gods and mortals. Her story raises questions about power, class and finding one's identity. We will explore how duty and individuality diverge to reveal the difficulties of cultivating one's own future. The content of the course will be assessed through in-class discussions led by students and weekly journal entries. At the end of the semester, students will complete a writing assignment of their choice which will be discussed in class.

Course Objectives

Students will be able to understand the context of character development and how Miller adapts and reworks source material from 8th century BC. They will understand the sacrifices associated with individuality and challenging social norms. Students will also analyze their own understanding of freedom and the challenges of attaining power for an individual who is disadvantaged by their society.

Required Textbooks

Circe by Madeline Miller – Hardcover, paperback, Kindle, audiobook. Also available on loan through Library West and Alachua County Public Library but please note that you will need access to the book throughout the entire semester.

Recommended Materials

The Odyssey by Homer, translated by Emily Wilson – Hardcover, paperback, Kindle, audiobook.

Weekly Journal Entries

To encourage weekly reading and assess your understanding of the chapter(s), there will be weekly journal entries. This will be a Canvas assignment with either a text box submission or a photo submission for those who prefer to keep a physical journal. Journal entries are expected

to include your reactions or thoughts on the chapters and are required to have **both** a question and a quote that stood out to you with an explanation as to why it did. These entries are intended to encourage connection with the material and begin analyzing topics that may be discussed in class. **Minimum of 100 words.**

Attendance and Class Expectations

Attendance is required. If you will not be able to attend class that week, please reach out to me and let me know so we can discuss options.

Discussions will be led by 2-3 student-leaders. Student-leaders are expected to have prepared topics and questions for the class discussion. They will be chosen the second week of class after the add/drop period. There will be room for flexibility as the in-class discussion unfolds; as long as each member participates in leading part of the discussion, they will get full points.

Final Assignment

The final assignment is a response to the book. We will discuss different topics throughout the course of the class that may challenge your previous notions. This assignment is designed to embrace what you've learned and apply it to your life moving forward. This project can be a video, blog, book, alternate imagining, or something entirely different. Further requirements for the assignment can be found in Canvas.
