Course Overview and Purpose

Marine ecosystems compose more than three quarters of the world's animal biomass and cover more than two thirds of the planet's surface. Conservation of these ecosystems is robust and multifaceted, practiced by professionals in academia, industry, non-profit, and government settings, each of which has unique approaches to protecting the oceans.

During spring break, we will visit San Diego, a global capital of marine conservation practice, to explore and compare the ways that marine conservation is practiced today, from classic science to technology to policy making. We'll visit the Scripps Institution of Oceanography, the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA), the University of California-San Diego, the Birch Aquarium, and Cabrillo National Monument. Activities will include laboratory tours, equipment demonstrations, observing wildlife captures or surveys, and hands-on time at coastal tide pools. From these experiences, we'll assemble a holistic picture of the current practice of marine conservation in all its forms.

Course Objectives

- Observe marine conservation practices in laboratory and practical settings
- Compare and contrast the types of scientific work undertaken by scientists and practitioners working in marine conservation
- Reflect on the complexities of science in practice and on your own expectations and professional goals

Required Materials

All required readings will be posted on Canvas. For our time in California, you will need footwear appropriate for walking through tidepools such as close-toed water shoes or sneakers that can get wet.
