Course Description

This discussion-based course examines 21st-century horror cinema as a vital and evolving artistic form, exploring how contemporary horror challenges the boundaries between high and low art. Once dismissed as mere genre entertainment, horror has increasingly been recognized for its aesthetic innovation, cultural critique, and psychological depth. Drawing on critical theory, film studies, and cultural analysis, we will investigate how horror films reflect and distort collective anxieties around gender, race, technology, class, and the body. Students will collaboratively select the films we study, from mainstream blockbusters to arthouse experiments, and each will be paired with academic readings that frame horror as a site of artistic performance and social commentary. By analyzing horror's visual style, narrative strategies, and thematic concerns, we will consider what it means for a film to be both terrifying and artistically ambitious. This course is ideal for students interested in film, performance, and the cultural work of fear.

Film Pairings

Every film in this course will be selected by the students. Students will be assigned a number (e.g., S1: Jane Doe; S2: John Doe, and so on) and placed into six groups. Groupings will be finalized after the drop/add period ends on January 16. Each student will participate in a group twice over the course of the semester.

Films will be chosen from a curated list and must be selected by the group at least one week before the film is scheduled. One group representative will post the selected film to the course discussion board for classmates to review in advance. The group that selects the film will be

responsible for leading class discussion by engaging with relevant peer-reviewed articles, critical essays, or video essays related to the film. On the Sunday prior to the film's first class discussion, group members (via a single designated submitter) must upload a brief "lesson plan" to Canvas. This document should outline proposed discussion topics, key scenes, themes, and any critical reflections drawn from independent readings. The group is expected to open the class session by leading the initial discussion of the film.

Note: To ensure a wide range of critical perspectives, students are encouraged to select films that contribute to the overall diversity of the course. If a previous group has chosen a film within a particular subgenre (e.g., found footage or slasher), subsequent groups should aim to select a film that explores different stylistic, thematic, or formal approaches.

In-class recording
