Course description

Maybe you've sung "I Won't Back Down" at the Swamp, been to Heartwood for a show, or attended The Fest, but do you really know the music history of Gainesville, Florida? Through this course, students will be introduced to the artists who've at some point called Gainesville - or a surrounding town - "home," such as Bo Diddley, Tom Petty and the Heartbreakers, Stephen Stills, Minnie Riperton, Sister Hazel, and Driveaway. A range of genres, from folk to rock to indie pop will be explored. Students will assume the role of music journalists, reviewing one to two albums by local musicians each week, posting their reviews to a discussion board. As a class we'll discuss themes found within the lyrics and how they relate to the social and political times in which they were produced, analyzing the complex history of Gainesville. Through this course, students will be introduced to library and archival research, exploring the collections of the George A. Smathers Libraries for artifacts and ephemera documenting the rich music history of this southern town. Students will be encouraged to explore Gainesville, visiting historical sites and venues, comparing how the city looks now to photographs taken at the time in which the musicians were performing.

Course Materials

Each week, students will be expected to listen to 2-3 albums before class. In addition to the albums, students may be assigned supplementary reading materials (such as newspaper articles or interviews) publicly available online or through the library.

While no textbooks are required, I highly recommend reading the following books:

Materials Fee

Students must have access to a music streaming platform - such as Spotify or Apple Music - to listen to the albums assigned each week. Depending on which streaming service plan students choose, the materials fee may range from \$0.00 to approximately \$23.96.

- [Spotify Premium cost](#)
 - A four-month individual trial of Spotify is free, and costs \$11.99/month afterwards.
 - A student Spotify plan costs \$5.99/month, with the first month free.

Course Objectives

Course Goals

Throughout the duration of the course “Gainesville was a Big Town: Exploring the Music Roots of Gainesville, Florida,”

- Students will be introduced to artists who at one point called Gainesville “home,” recognizing their contributions to the music industry.
- Students will acquire the skills necessary for conducting academic research and will locate archival sources relevant to the history of Gainesville music.

Student Learning Outcomes

By the end of this course, students will be able to:

- **Identify** local musicians and their discographies and **analyze** the themes found within the albums of local musicians and how they relate to the social and political times in which they were produced.
- **Explore** the collections of the George A. Smathers Libraries, searching the catalog and digital collections for resources pertaining to the local music history, as well as Gainesville history in general.
- **Create** a concert poster, album cover, or zine inspired by ephemera from the library collections, with a corresponding playlist of works from local musicians we've discussed in class.

Grading and Class Policies

Assignments

Class participation

Students are expected to actively participate in class by contributing to class discussions by sharing insights and asking questions.

Discussion board reviews

Each week before class, you will be assigned to listen to 2-3 albums or a playlist relevant to the genre, era, or band being discussed that week. You will then review the albums/songs you listened to, analyzing the music, lyrics, or theme. Please post your reviews by each Thursday before class and comment on at least one classmate's review. Check out [Rolling Stone](#) to get an idea for music reviews. Some questions/ideas to consider when writing your reviews:

- What stood out to you? Were there any notable themes or lyrics?
- What do you think of the album overall? What did you like/dislike?
- How did this album make you feel? What did it make you think of?

- Would you recommend this album? Why or why not?

You do not need to explicitly address each of the above questions. Have fun with it!

Final presentation

At the end of the course, students will have the opportunity to design either a concert poster, album cover, or zine based on what they have learned in class. The poster, album, or zine can be virtual or physical; feel free to use software such as Word, Canva, or Photoshop, or collage, draw, paint, etc. Be creative! Use posters or album covers from the UF Digital Collections as reference. For example, students may take inspiration from the [Giants of Rock'n'Roll Concert Italian Tour Poster](#) or the [Poster Advertising a Concert, Music by Mudcrutch](#). Bonus points for using (and citing!) images from the Digital Collections.

If students opt to design a concert poster, they should create a hypothetical lineup of Gainesville musicians. Think of this as your dream Gator Growl. Who do you wish you could see?

Alternatively, if you choose to design an album cover, create a playlist of Gainesville musicians to accompany it. You can base the playlist off one artist, a vibe/genre, or choose songs from a range of Gainesville musicians.

Want to do a zine? Feel free to base it off a genre, decade, or musician/band from the Gainesville music scene. For example, you could make a zine about the punk music in Gainesville, highlighting bands, venues, and festivals prominent in the punk scene. You could also make a zine focused on the bands from a particular era, such as the 60s-70s or 90s.

On the last day of class, each student will present their project to the class, highlighting what they learned throughout the semester.
