Course Description

Through a close reading of Jennifer Donnelly's novel, Stepsister, and a discussion of the elements of theme, character development, and perspective, this course will explore the features of a fractured fairy tale.

Course Objectives

Students will be able to:

- Compare and contrast fairy tale versions to understand the concept of "fractured fairy tales"
- Utilize close reading to trace the development of theme, character, and plot
- Present a final project on a literary element of choice and its development throughout the novel using citations and evidence to support interpretation and findings
