Course Description. Overview and Purpose

Anthropogenic climate change is an existential threat to humanity's way of life on Earth in the 21st century. Concern about the causes and impacts of climate change are arguably at an all-time high, but there is little consensus on solutions that are logistically, economically, and socially feasible. In this course, we'll consider the solutions proposed by one of society's significant influential thinkers; working through Bill Gates' text *How to Avoid a Climate Disaster: The Solutions We Have and the Breakthroughs We Need*, we will wrestle with the current challenges humans face in addressing the climate crisis.

Through weekly Socratic discussions, three short reflection essays, and a presentation, we will explore these topics. By the end of the class, we likely won't arrive at a cogent answer of how to solve this problem, but we'll aim to be more able to critically and substantively discuss and understand the complexities surrounding this immensely complex issue.

Course Objectives

By the end of this course, students will be able to

- Identify significant causes and impact of anthropogenic climate change
- Describe logistic, economic, and social feasibility of proposed solutions to climate change
- Evaluate solutions in Florida's current political and socioeconomic contexts

Required Textbook

Bill Gates. How to Avoid a Climate Disaster: The Solutions We Have and the Breakthroughs We Need. 2022.

Required Technology

Students need to have access to a personal computer or laptop with a working webcam and microphone in order to access all features of the course Canvas site, and to participate in online office hours. Broadband internet access is required.

Class Attendance and Activities: Students significantly contribute to creating a comfortable and productive learning environment by attending and participating productively in class. I encourage questions and sharing of relevant experiences! Grades are based on attendance and frequency and quality of student contributions to the class.

Reflection Journals: Every week, you will respond to questions that reinforce the read material. These assignments free response questions are intended to help you organize your thoughts and prepare for a fruitful discussion in class. These assignments are due on Tuesdays @ 11:59pm on weeks they are assigned.

Case Study Presentation: You will work with a group of your classmates to evaluate the solutions we will read about in the context of Florida, choose one you think is most actionable, and share it with the class, explaining why your group sees a particularly actionable path with the solution you choose. These presentations will be given in the final week of class and should reflect the breadth of material we discuss in the preceding weeks.

Specific grading criteria for each assignment will be provided on Canvas. You are responsible for maintaining duplicate copies of all work submitted in this course until the end of the semester. In case of a grading dispute, you must notify the instructor via e-mail within one week of the date the grade is posted. It is your responsibility to ensure that all assignments are successfully uploaded to Canvas. Missing, corrupt, or incompatible files may result in grade penalties up to a score of zero for the assignment.

Late Work

You are responsible for turning assignments in on time unless an extension has been requested via e-mail prior to the deadline. In case of true documented emergencies, I may waive this requirement. <u>Technical difficulties are not generally an excuse for missing an assessment or assignment</u>; you should have contingency plans in case any such issues arise. Try not to wait until the last minute to submit assignments!

Late submissions will incur a penalty of 20% per day. A day is defined as 24 hours from the due date and time. Submissions more than three days late will receive a grade of zero.

I <u>highly</u> recommend starting work on assignments early to preclude unexpected emergencies or latesemester stress from compromising your grade. Deadline extensions may be available on certain assignments if requested ahead of time via e-mail, but must be justified. If extended deadlines are not met, late penalties will be assessed based on the <u>original</u>, not the revised due date!

Finally, please do not wait until the end of the semester to discuss problems with the course material or performance in class. The preferred way to get ahold of me of class and office hours is via Canvas message or UF e-mail. Canvas Display Name Change

Canvas uses the "Display Name" as set in myUFL. The Display Name is what you want people to see in the UF Directory, such as "Ally" instead of "Allison." To update your display name, go to one.ufl.edu, click on the dropdown at the top right, and select "Directory Profile." Click "Edit" on the right of the name panel, uncheck "Use my legal name" under "Display Name," update how you wish your name to be displayed, and click "Submit" at the bottom. This change may take up to 24 hours to appear in Canvas. This does not change your legal name for official UF records.

Zoom Conference Privacy

Should it become necessary or convenient to hold classes virtually using zoom, those class sessions may be audio-visually recorded for students in the class to refer back and for enrolled students who are unable to attend live. Students who participate with their camera engaged or utilize a profile image are agreeing to have their video or image recorded. If you are unwilling to consent to have your profile or video image recorded, be sure to keep your camera off and do not use a profile image. In-Class Recording
